Compatriots and Friends,

How to get involved! Routine attendance at our general membership lunch meetings is a great first step and it should start pre-membership with our prospective members and applicants coming to meetings and seeing what we are about.

Over the last three years our Chapter has grown exponentially – not just in numbers but in our promotion and deliverance of core programs of the SAR. How have and do we accomplish this?

Patriotic:

- We actively promote the America 250 Celebration with recitals and reports at all Chapter meetings and with some delivered to outside groups and classrooms.
- We recognize private organizations and property owners who properly display the America flag. We also attend flag retirement ceremonies.
- We plan to attend upcoming new citizen naturalization ceremonies.

- We have and will continue to participate in the Patriot Grave Marking Program.
- Our Chapter Color Guard, dressed in period attire, is active in making community appearances at local parades and patriotic ceremonies.

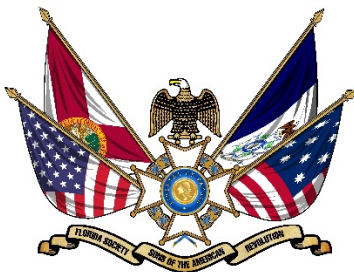

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING SUMMARY – MAY 31, 2025

At our May 31, 2025 meeting we had 11 members and 12 guests for a total attendance of 23. Members (11): Chuck Adams, President, Treasurer, Registrar & Genealogist; Mark Snider ^{ca}, Secretary; Kevin Shurte ^{ca}, Historian; Tom Carpenter Jr, Chaplain; Bruce Angier; Jim Clark ^{ca}; Ted Duay; Greg Elder; Jim Lohmeyer; John Sauerwald; and Braeden Shurte. Prospective Members / Guests (12): Dr. Robert Easton; Samuel Frankel Jr; Jeff Little; Dan McMurtrie; Bradley Mueller; Ronna Adams; Amanda Barnes; Ellen Higginbotham; Linda McMurtrie; Jennifer Mueller; Ceta McDonald; and Kathy Shurte ^{ca}. The superscript ^{ca} records compatriots and guests attending in colonial attire.



Color Guardsmen Jim Clark, Braeden Shurte & Mark Snider led by Kevin Shurte posted the colors. The Invocation was given by Tom Carpenter Jr. Chuck Adams led the participants in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and the SAR Pledge. He then led the participants in reciting the SAR Mission Statement. Braeden Shurte gave the 250 Minute on The Battle of Fairhaven which was fought on May 14, 1775.



Chuck Adams acknowledged the presence of our newest member and today's inductee, Greg Elder. He welcomed our newest applicant Bradley Mueller and his wife Jennifer, who is a member of the Major William Lauderdale Chapter DAR. Also attending are applicants Jeff Little, and Dan McMurtrie who is here with his wife Linda. He then recognized prospective applicants Dr. Robert Easton and Samuel Frankel Jr., and he said that other prospective applicants that are not here are David Pinney and Jason Ramsey. Chuck reported that we started the year with 80 members. We are now at 82 but by the end of this year we could be at or over 90 assuming the submission and approval of the current list of applicants.

Chuck Adams gave the Financial Status Reported as of April 30, 2025. He stated that the May 2025 Newsletter has been circulated. It includes the Member Profile of Jeffrey Z. Little whose application is expected to be approved by NSSAR in June 2025. He said that the newsletter also has a list of all currently known 2025 events of Chapter interest.

In the absence of Steve DePaul, Chuck Adams stated that an update on the FLSSAR First Amphibious Assault Landing Memorial Project was given on May 17, 2025 at the Spring Board of Management (BOM) Meeting. The total project cost is estimated at \$207,500. Based on in-kind, cash donations and grants received to date, the Committee needs to raise \$63,500 by December 2025 to stay on track for the dedication planned for March 2026.

Mark Snider stated that the Executive Committee did not meet over the last month.

Mark reported that for 2025, we currently have 5,121 points for US Stark Memorial Report. Recent veteran support activities included the Chapter's color guard attending the April 5th Honor Flight South Florida (HFSF) Welcome Home, presenting the colors at the May 4th Symphonic Winds fundraising concert for Honor Flights, and marching in the May 26th Pompano Beach Memorial Day ceremony. Other activities include volunteering at Nininger and the VA Health Clinic, attendance at Fleet Week events, cash donations to USO and Honor Flights, and decorating Veteran's graves.

Mark stated that he and Chuck Adams participated in the May 20, 2025 VAVS quarterly meeting via Teams but that nothing of importance affecting Broward County was discussed. He said that he has submitted a new VA Centenarian Award application for Frank Orilio of Hollywood, FL. Frank will turn 103 in November and served in the Army Air Force and Army Mortar Platoon in WW II.

Mark said that May is Military appreciation month. He asked all Compatriot Veterans in attendance to stand and be recognized.

Mark stated that he has been appointed as Vice-Chair of the FLSSAR Veterans Affairs Committee for 2025-2026. He said that his son and Fort Lauderdale Compatriot Major Zachary Snider was awarded the Air and Space Commendation Medal for Meritorious Service on completion of his assignment at Aviano Air Base, Italy.

Kevin Shurte gave the 250 Anniversary Recognition Report and power point presentation entitled, *Second Continental Congress Convenes - May 10, 1775*, which is also published in the May 2025 Newsletter.



On youth education, Kevin used a power point slide to show how the Chapter has grown from no participation in 2023, to one contest in 2024, and to six of the eight in 2025. The slide showed that all of our first place winners came in either first, second or third at State. He said that at the May 16-17, 2025 Board of Management (BOM) meeting the Chapter's first place Middle School Brochure submitted by Madeline Maragh was awarded first place at State and has been submitted to National where NSSAR winners will be announced in July 2025 at the 136th Annual Conference. Also attending the Youth Awards Luncheon at the BOM on May 17, 2025 was Hannah Lee Levitt who was the Chapter's first place winner in the American History Teachers Award Contest and was recognized at the BOM for both her first place win at State and second place win at National. Cadet Caleb Walker from Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School and his mother Sally attended the May 17th Youth Awards Luncheon. In addition to placing first in the Chapter's Outstanding JROTC Cadet contest, he was recognized for his first place win at State and his fourth place win at National.

Kevin Shurte stated that he will continue as Chairman of the FLSSAR Youth Education Committee and that planning for the 2025-2026 year has already started.

Chuck Adams reported on the status of the SAR ROTC and Sea Cadet Bronze Medal Awards Program. Chuck said that of the 31 Broward County schools offering the JROTC program, we completed the last of our 30 presentations or deliveries to qualifying cadets on May 19, 2025. He said that this year's success in being at the awards ceremonies for 22 of the schools was made possible by the nine Chapter members who volunteered to assist and represent the Chapter. Chuck said that the ceremony conducted by the Fort Lauderdale Division of the Navy League will be held on June 1, 2025 to present the SAR Bronze Good Citizenship Medal to their nominated Sea Cadet. Tom Carpenter Jr. will represent the Chapter at this awards ceremony which will then fully complete this year's JROTC / Sea Cadet medal awards program.

Well wishes were extended to Compatriot Jim Lohmeyer, who celebrated his 95th birthday on May 19, 2025.

Chuck Adams inducted Compatriot Gregory Roether Elder. Ted Duay presented him with the Rosette recognition lapel pin.



Chuck Adams presented the SAR 250 Bronze Medal Certificate to non-member, Amanda Barnes. Kevin Shurte presented her Bronze 250 Medal. Chuck then presented the SAR 250 Gold Medal Certificate to non-member, Kathy Shurte. Kevin Shurte presented her Gold 250 Medal.



Chuck Adams presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Braeden Shurte for his entry on behalf of the Swamp Fox Society C.A.R. in the 2025 Middle School Brochure Contest. Kevin Shurte stated that Braden's brochure was on the battles of Lexington and Concord and he presented Braeden with the SAR Shot Heard Around the World Medal which commemorates these battles.



Chuck Adams stated that at the May 16-17, 2025 Board of Management (BOM) meeting the Chapter placed second for a mid-sized Florida chapter. The FLSSAR also gave Certificates of Appreciation to Florida Society Committee Chairman Steve DePaul and Kevin Shurte, and a Certificate of Distinguished Service to S.E. Regional VP Chuck Adams.



On behalf of the Florida Society, Chuck Adams presented the FLSSAR Silver Henry Knox Medal to Mark Snider for his work on the 2024-2025 Veterans Affairs Committee where he was instrumental in getting several Chapters to submit reports that had

not previously participated. This allowed the Florida Society to qualify for recognition by National.



Chuck Adams stated that twenty-seven members and applicants made contributions to the funding of the First Amphibious Assault Landing Memorial Project. Of the twenty-seven, twenty-two contributed \$250 or more in response to the challenge which qualifies those contributors to receive the official Florida Society Challenge Coin commemorating the First Amphibious Assault Landing. Chuck Adams presented coins, in addition to himself, to: Bruce Angier, Jim Clark, Greg Elder, Samuel Frankel Jr, Jim Lohmeyer, Kevin Shurte, and Mark Snider. For recipients that are not present, their coin will be mailed out.



Chuck Adams led the participants in reciting the SAR Recessional. The Benediction was given by Tom Carpenter Jr.

AMERICA 250***Why Bunker Hill?******A Look at the Lead Up to Battle - June 17, 1775***

In the spring of 1775 Boston was a city full of fury. The Boston reaction to the Stamp Act and Townsend Tea Tax prompted the British to close the port of Boston, causing unemployment in the shipping industry, general economic decline and resentment of the placement of British troops in the city.

The April 19, 1775 British incursion to Lexington and Concord resulted in the British being chased back into Boston by local militia. The weeks following Lexington and Concord saw 15,000 New England militiamen build a siege around the parameters of the city.¹ British held Boston faced the possibility of being starved out with little food or necessities coming into the city over land. Boston was almost an island, but for a narrow isthmus to the south connecting to the Massachusetts mainland. Across the harbor from the Boston peninsula were hills to the north and south. A series of three small hills stood to the north in Charlestown. To the south stood somewhat steeper hills known as Dorchester Heights. Artillery placed atop either of these rises could lob cannon balls into the city and upon ships in Boston Harbor.

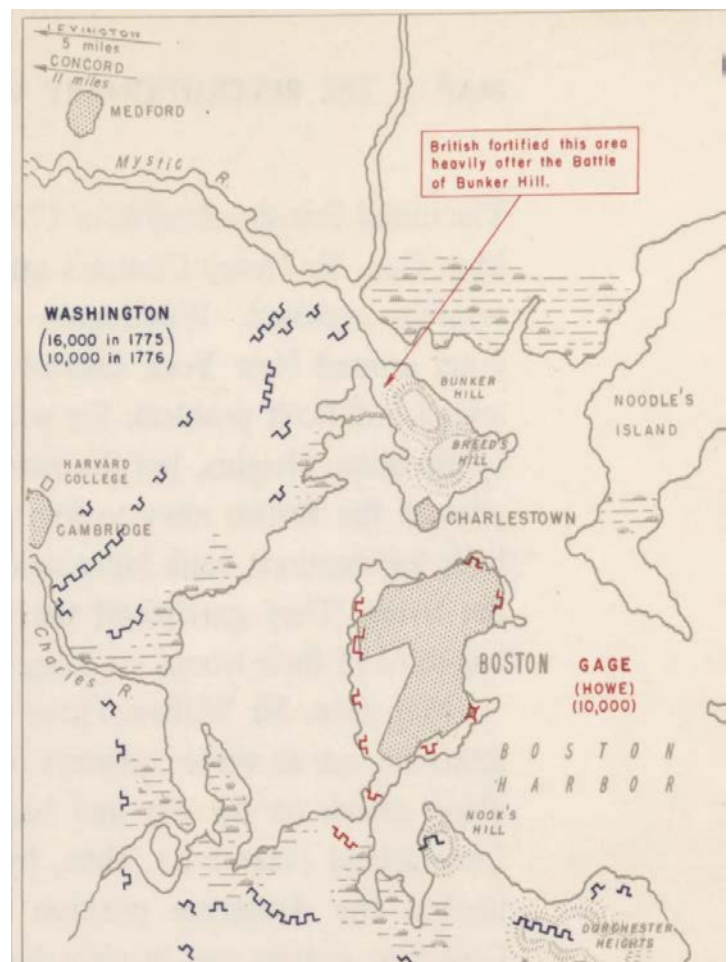
The British command planned a two prong foray to break out of Boston: occupy Dorchester Heights and then move on the hills in Charlestown pushing beyond Charlestown to an attack on the American headquarters in Cambridge scheduled for June 19.² Both American and British commands had effective spy networks, so the British plans became known to the Americans. The Massachusetts Committee of Safety ordered Bunker Hill to be fortified.

On the night of June 16 twelve hundred men began fortification of the Charlestown hills, focusing first on construction of a redoubt on the lower Breeds Hill and then on the larger Bunker Hill. Sunrise on June 17 gave the British a complete picture of the colonial fortification. The British command determined that they could not wait another day to initiate their planned incursions to the north and south. Within six hours the British began to cross the harbor to Charlestown to destroy the American fortifications and occupy the hills.³

The Americans held off two attacks of British infantry and grenadiers, inflicting heavy losses on the British. By the third attack, American ammunition was depleted and Americans had begun a retreat. The British overtook the Breeds Hill redoubt at bayonet point, slaughtering the American defenders.

The British took the hills, but at an exacting cost. Of 2,200 troops, they had 1,054 casualties. The Americans suffered 115 dead and 305 wounded. British General Henry Clinton wrote "The success is too dearly bought."⁴

SAR MEMBER PROFILE – DANIEL EDWARD McMURTRIE

Q. Ok Dan, tell us a little bit about yourself.

A. I was born in 1954 in Utica, New York, and grew up in that area of New York. I graduated from New York Mills Jr/Sr High School in June 1972. I then attended RCA Institutes in NYC where I attained a certificate of

completion. In 1988, I qualified for a State of Florida B Water Treatment Operators License. In 1998, I earned an AA Degree in Political Science from Broward Community College.

Q. What is/was your occupation?

A. In the Utica, NY area, I was mostly employed in building and grounds maintenance and management at various industries. From May 1973 to June 1979 I was an active first responder for the Yorkville, NY Volunteer Fire Department. I moved to South Florida in June 1979, where I started as a night stock person/cashier at Grand Union Markets in Wilton Manors. In March 1980 I was employed by the City of Hollywood Utilities Department and worked my way up to Water Treatment Operator and Plant Safety Officer. As Union Steward and a member of the Executive Board for Hollywood General Employees AFSCME Local 2432, I was instrumental in negotiating an early retirement in 1995. In January 1999 I began my career with the School Board of Broward County as a Campus Monitor. In August 2001, I was promoted to the position of Exceptional Student Education (ESE) Job Coach. Training, seeking employment and helping these students maintain employment was one of the most rewarding jobs in my life. I retired in June 2014.

Q. Tell us about some of your recreational interests and/or hobbies.

A. I enjoy anything to do with trains, including real trains and models. I will go anywhere to just ride a train and I maintain a large HO size layout in my garage. Also, I am involved with Florida Citrus Model Train Society, www.fcmts.org. This group exhibits at various locations throughout Broward County. Featuring several large layouts and providing

educational and safety lectures, including Operation Lifesaver, we strive to make model railroading fun for all. My other passion is automobiles and in my younger years I owned an Edsel.

Q. How about your family?

A. I was married in April 1983 to my beautiful bride Linda Hiland. I have an older brother and younger half-brother.

Q. Who is your Patriot ancestor?

A. My Patriot ancestor is Peter Martin (1741-abt.1807). In 1781, he served as a private in Culpeper County VA Militia under the command of Captain George Johnson.

Q. Tell us about why you want to join SAR and whether you have plans on how you may want to get more involved with carrying out the mission and programs of the SAR.

A. My father, Harry D. McMurtie, was a World War II era veteran who passed in 1957. My older brother, Peter, also a veteran and family historian, encouraged me to join this organization to foster its growth and values.
