**GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING
SUMMARY – DECEMBER 6, 2025**

At our December 6, 2025 meeting we had 18 members and 8 guests for a total attendance of 26. Members (18): Chuck Adams ^{ca}, President, Treasurer, Registrar & Genealogist; Steve DePaul, Vice President; Mark Snider ^{ca}, Secretary; Kevin Shurte ^{ca}, Historian; Bruce Angier; Robert Calamia; Jim Clark ^{ca}; Dr. Robert Easton Jr; Samuel Frankel Jr; Herb Gardner ^{ca}; Dan McMurtrie; Jason Milgram ^{ca}; Brad Mueller; David Pinney; Trent Prock; Dr. Robert Reeder; Gerry Reeder; and John Sauerwald. Prospective Members / Guests (8): Patrick Reeder; Ronna Adams; Natalia Frankel; Christina Prock; Linda McMurtrie; Chris Lapresti; Malcomb Flavell; and Omer Warshavsky. Chuck Adams stated that there would be a special presentation and asked Compatriot Jason Milgram to make the announcement.

Jason Milgram said that one of his new ventures is a record recording company called Settle Down Productions LLC. He introduced general manager Omer Warshavsky and musical director Malcolm Flavell, who then presented the Chapter with a check for \$1,000 to be used in the funding of Chapter programs. Chuck Adams thanked them and accepted the check on behalf of the Chapter.



Led by Kevin Shurte, Color Guardsmen Mark Snider, Jim Clark, Jason Milgram, and Herb Gardner posted the colors.



The Invocation was given by David Pinney. Chuck Adams led the participants in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. He then led the participants in reciting the SAR Mission Statement and SAR Pledge.

Herb Gardner gave this month's 250 Minute on *The Continental Congress Response to the British Proclamation of Rebellion – December 6, 1775.*



Chuck Adams acknowledged the presence of our newest applicant, Patrick Reeder. He then welcomed our newest members to be inducted today: Samuel Solomon Frankel Jr, who is here with his wife Natallia, Trent Dustin Prock, who is here with his wife Christina, Dr. Robert Morrell Easton Jr, and Robert Allen Calamia. He said that

Robert Calamia's son, Nathan, and father, Joseph, are both out-of-state and will be inducted at a future date through Zoom. Also among our newest members are Brad Mueller and David Pinney both of whom will be inducted at our next meeting in January 2026. Chuck stated that we started this year with 80 members. We are now at 91 members and there are two additional applications that might be approved before December 31st.

Chuck Adams said that the Executive Committee conducted a Zoom meeting on September 28, 2025. In accordance with our Bylaws, the ExCom members acting as the Nominations Committee approved the Proposed Slate of 2026 Chapter Elected Officers. He said that the proposed slate was announced at the Chapter meeting held October 22, 2025, and advertised in the October and November 2025 Newsletters.

He asked Secretary, Mark Snider to read the names and positions of the proposed slate of 2026 Chapter officers. Mark Snider then announced the names and positions.

Chuck Adams asked whether there were any additional nominations to be made for the floor. Hearing none, he closed nominations. Chuck Adams asked for a maker and second of the **Motion:** to approve the slate of 2026 officers as recommended by the Executive Committee on November 19, 2025. Chuck Adams recognized Jim Clark as the maker of the motion, seconded by Bruce Angier. Unanimously approved.

Chuck Adams gave the Financial Status Report as of November 30, 2025. He said that the November 2025 Newsletter has been circulated. It includes the Member Profile of Trent D. Prock. He also said that the newsletter lists all currently known remaining events of Chapter interest for 2025, and includes important first quarter 2026 events such as the Liberty Tree Dedication at Tamarac on January 31, 2026 and the FAAM Monument Dedication on March 14, 2026.



Steve DePaul provided an update on the FLSSAR First Amphibious Assault Memorial (FAAM) Project. He said that they recently received their permits and the project is on schedule for completion in time for the dedication on Saturday, March 14 2026 at Fisher Family Pier in Pompano Beach. He said that in-kind contributions and funds

collected to date amount to over \$207,943 of the \$225,000 fundraising goal. Of just under \$148,000 of cash needed, they are almost there and are ready to place the order for the fabrication of the monument.



Mark Snider stated that the Executive Committee met via Zoom on November 30, 2025. The Amended Budget as of November 30, 2025 was approved authorizing miscellaneous balancing adjustments and transfer of funds. A new \$250 donation to the FLSCAR President's Project was also approved.

On veteran's support, Mark stated that we currently have 16,942 points toward the US Stark Memorial Award. Mark reported that the CDCE /VAVS Committee held a Zoom meeting on November 4, 2025. The committee continues to seek volunteers to serve at the VA Centers and has begun preparations for the Veteran Olympics scheduled for next summer. He said that Jim Clark has joined the Committee representing the Marine Corp League. Mark also said that we are still awaiting word from the VA on approval of the Centenarian Award for Mr. Frank Orilio of Hollywood.



Kevin Shurte gave the 250 Anniversary Recognition Report entitled, *The First Battle of Ninety-Six, South Carolina - November 19-21, 1775*, which is also published in the November 2025 Newsletter.

Kevin Shurte showed a slide of the eight youth education contests promoted by SAR indicating that we anticipate having contestants participating in each contest.

Kevin then summarized the criteria of the SAR American History Teacher Award Contest. He introduced Christopher Lopresti from Ramblewood Middle School as the Chapter's 2025-2026 winner.

Christopher Lopresti read his essay submitted as part of his application. Chuck Adams presented Christopher Lopresti with a check for \$100 and his SAR Bronze Good Citizenship Certificate recognizing him as the Broward County, FL first-place winner of the 2025-2026 SAR contest. Kevin Shurte then presented him with the SAR Bronze Good Citizenship Medal.



Chuck Adams inducted new member Compatriots Samuel Solomon Frankel Jr, Trent Dustin Prock, Robert Morrell Easton Jr, and Robert Allen Calamia, and he then presented each of them with their membership certificate.



Chuck Adams said that last month we presented certificates to three of the five recently approved members of the FLSSAR Veterans Battalion. Mark Snider then presented the FLSSAR Certificate of Membership to John Sauerwald.



Steve DePaul, assisted by Natalia Frankel and Christina Prock, presented each with their SAR Rosette recognition lapel pin.



Chuck Adams said that the November 2025 Newsletter published the names of 17 Compatriots achieving milestone anniversaries – 5, 10, 15, 20 and 30 years - for membership in SAR.

Chuck Adams asked John Sauerwald to come forward to receive his SAR 5-Year Certificate Award.



Chuck Adams presented the SAR Certificate of Appreciation to Jason Milgram for the \$1,000 donation made to the Chapter by his new recording venture, Settle Down Productions LLC.

Chuck Adams summarized the criteria for the Chapter President's annual award for the SAR Bronze Distinguished Service Award. He asked last year's recipient, Kevin Shurte, to come forward to help him present this year's award to Steve DePaul. He said that Steve has brought the Fort Lauderdale Chapter to the forefront of name recognition at the local, state and national level for his work in organizing, funding and constructing the FAAM Memorial Project, and he is therefore this year's recipient.



Chuck Adams led the participants in reciting the SAR Recessional. The Benediction was given by David Pinney.

AMERICA 250***The Liberty Tree***

*FTLSAR Liberty Tree – Dedicated January 31, 2026
Tamarac, Florida*

As we gather this year in cities and towns to commemorate America's semiquincentennial – 250 years since our nation's founding – it is fitting that we pay tribute not only to the people, documents, and events that led to our nation's founding but also to the powerful symbols of liberty that touched the lives of ordinary citizens. Chief among these were the Liberty Trees of the American colonies whose branches spread like the promise of freedom across the land.

The story of the Liberty Tree begins in Boston in 1646. Planted as part of an elm grove near Boston Common, the tree would one day become a rallying point for patriots protesting the tyranny of British rule. On August 14, 1765, the tree became the site of its first major protest when patriots gathered beneath the towering elm to protest Parliament's Stamp Act that levied taxes on all printed materials in the colonies. Protestors delivered speeches, hung from the tree an effigy of Boston Stamp Tax Collector, Andrew Oliver, and paraded through the streets chanting, "Liberty, property, and no stamps." Shortly thereafter, the protest organizers known as the Loyal Nine, attached a copper plate to the tree that read, "Tree of Liberty."

News of the tree quickly spread, and towns across the colonies from New England to the Carolinas began christening Liberty Trees of their own. "Much venerated by colonists," these natural landmarks

served as meeting places in the years leading up to the Revolutionary War symbolically showing that liberty had taken root in American soil (Blakemore).

What made Liberty Trees so remarkable was not their size or age, but their meaning. In an age before mass media, they were living, growing symbols of resistance and unity where people could gather to exchange ideas, organize protests, and affirm their shared commitment to liberty. In 1775, Thomas Paine celebrated the liberty tree in poetry when he wrote...

*"Unmindful of names or distinctions they
came,
For freemen like brothers agree,
With one spirit endued, they one friendship
pursued,
And their temple was Liberty Tree..."*

British officials also appreciated the potency of these symbols. During the 1775 occupation of Boston, a group of Loyalists and British soldiers cut down the famous Liberty Tree to cool the resistance and heat their quarters. Though the tree yielded 14 cords of wood, its destruction failed to stem the growing spirit of liberty.

This spirit continued to flourish in our budding nation. The ideals nurtured beneath the Liberty Trees – that life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness must be fervently protected – found expression in our founding documents. Though the physical trees often disappeared, their symbolic legacy thrived.

Today, Liberty Trees stand as relevant as ever. They remind us that liberty is not abstract but rather an ideal deeply rooted in community, dialogue, and participation. It does not grow in isolation; liberty grows where people congregate, speak freely, and take responsibility for their shared future. The Liberty Tree also reminds us that freedom is alive and, like a tree, requires care. Its branches must make room for future generations, and its roots must remain grounded in the principles of justice and equality.

While the original Liberty Tree fell to the axe over 250 years ago, the Tamarac Liberty Tree, and many others like it, stands proudly as a symbol of the enduring hope and freedom embodied in our Constitution and celebrated in every American heart.

FIRST AMPHIBIOUS ASSAULT MEMORIAL



As of January 6, 2026, the FAAM Committee updated the total project cost from the

original estimate of \$225,000 to \$260,000. The update reflects final numbers for most miscellaneous cost estimates. To date \$236,738.76 has been raised leaving \$23,262 to go. With all permits received and the hard costs for fabrication and construction on-hand, the project will break ground later in January 2026. Dedication of the monument is a SAR National Event and is on schedule for March 14, 2026.
